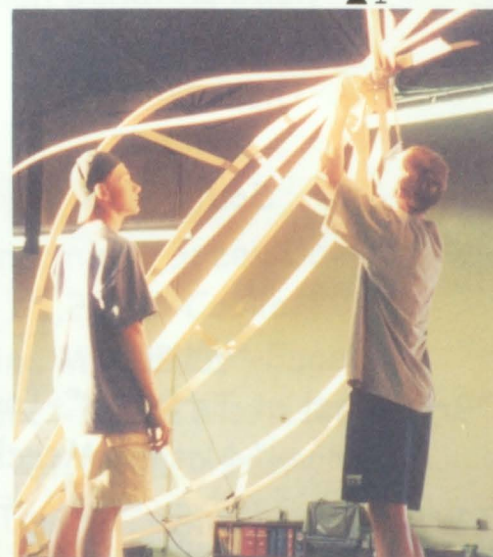
Reenergize with spirit

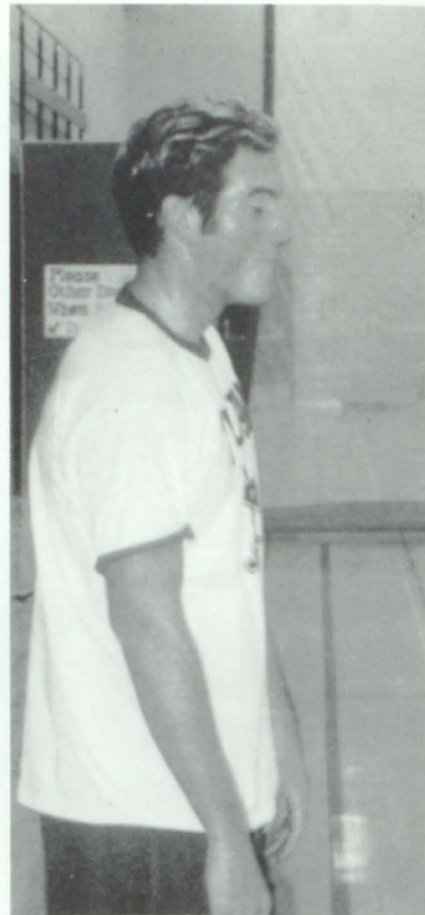

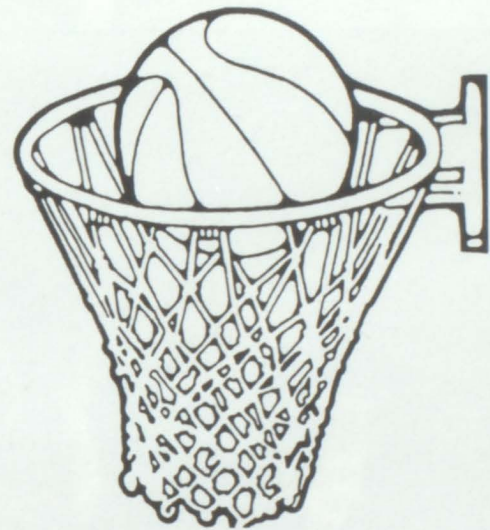

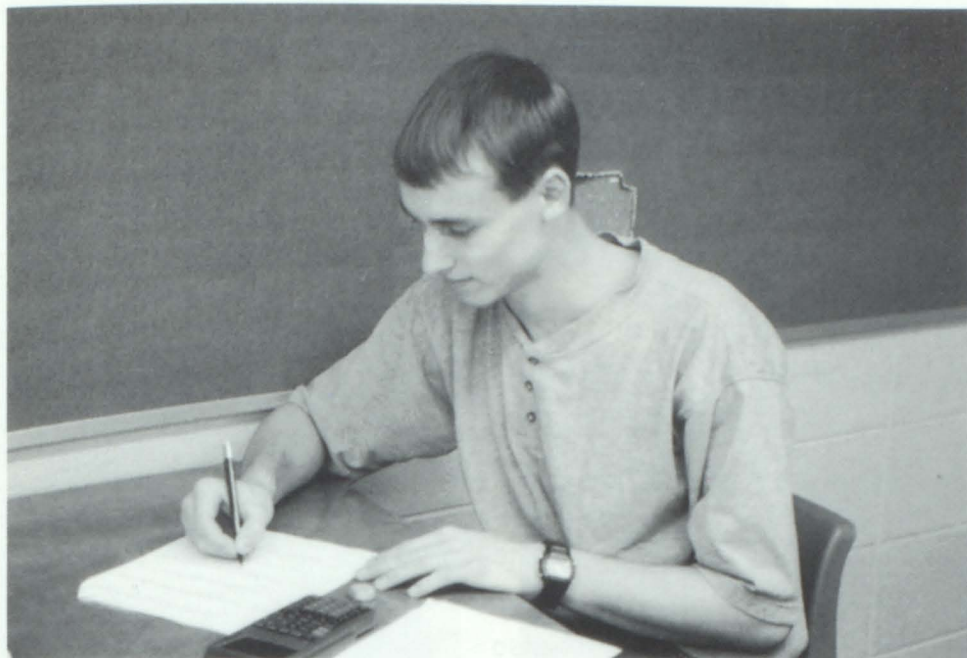

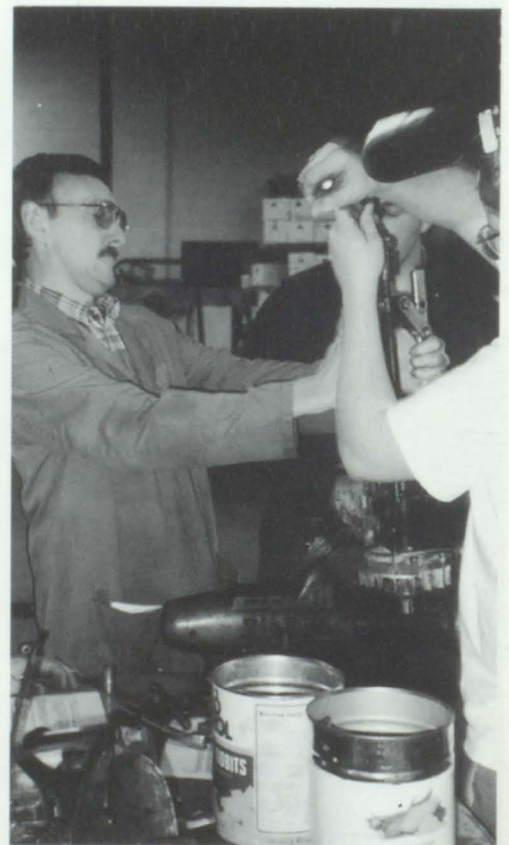

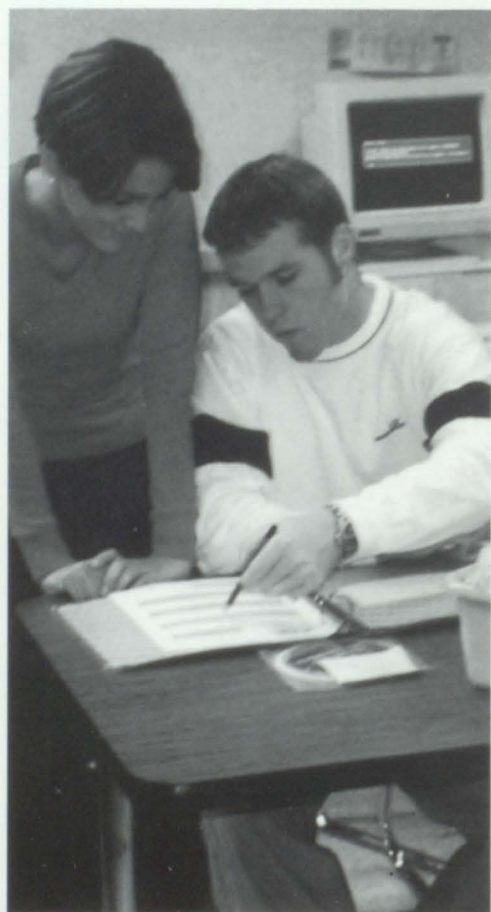
With new layouts

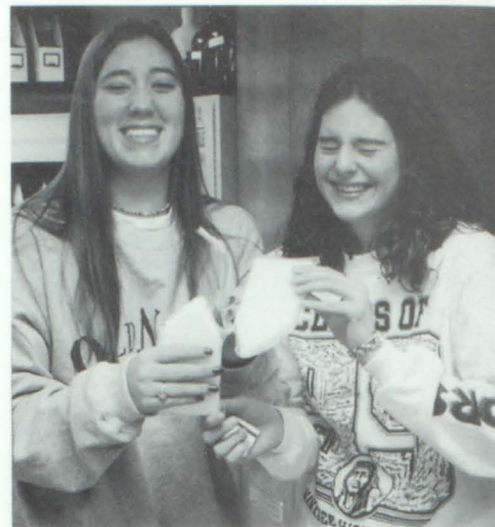

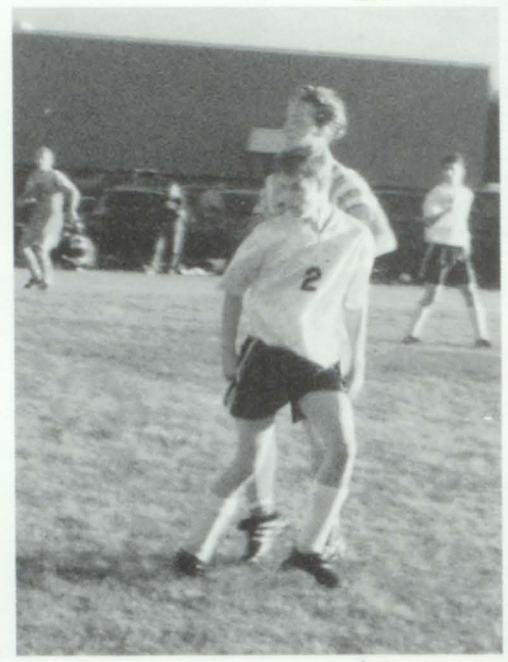
Reestablishing With a great year

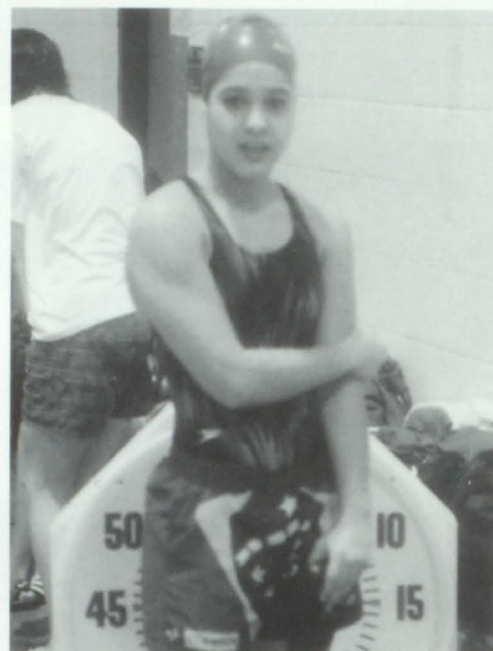
Reassembling With new records

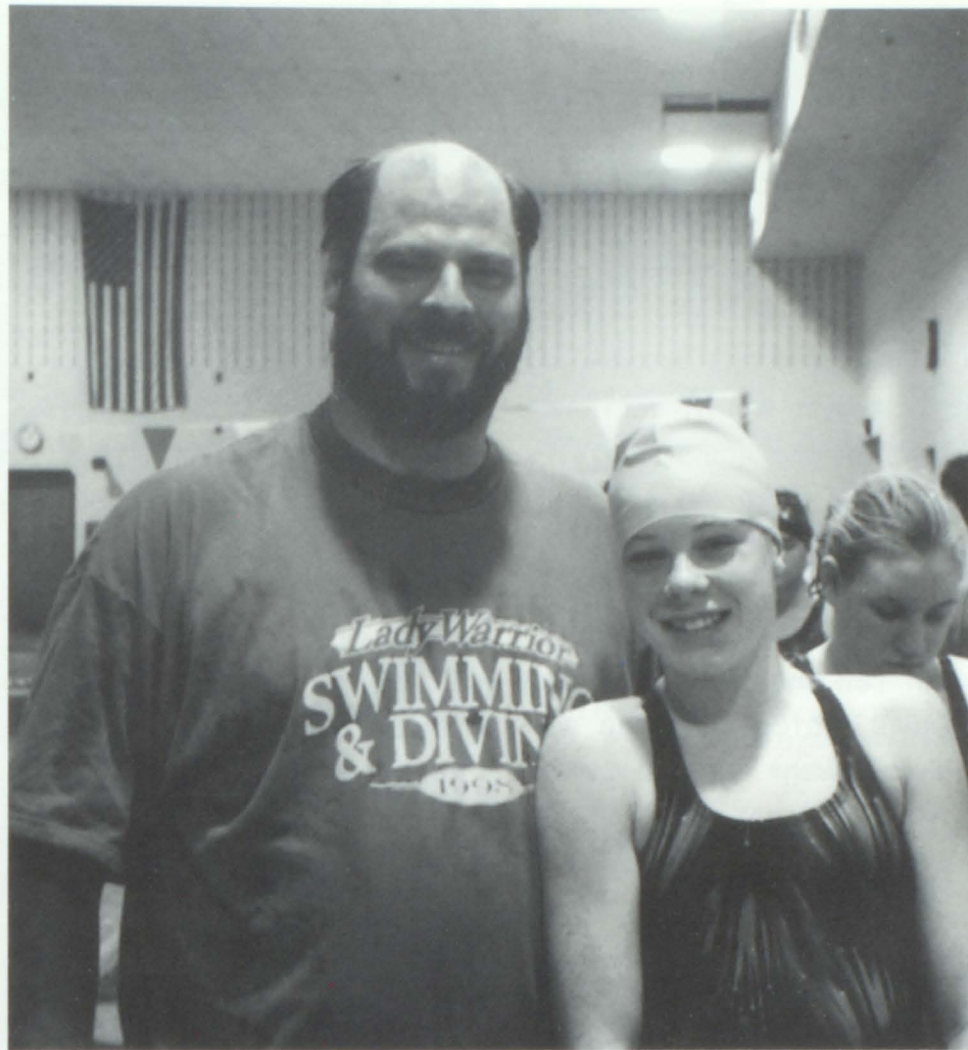

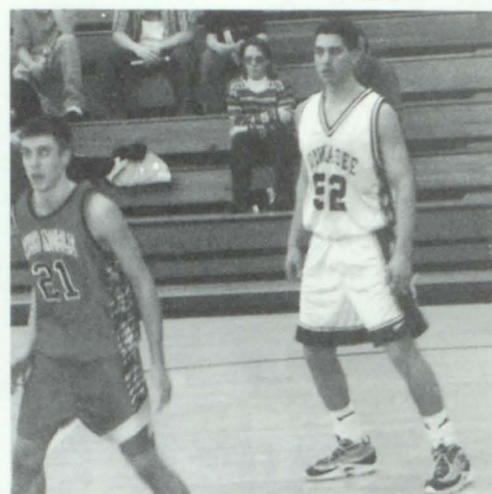
ReBouncing With great ability

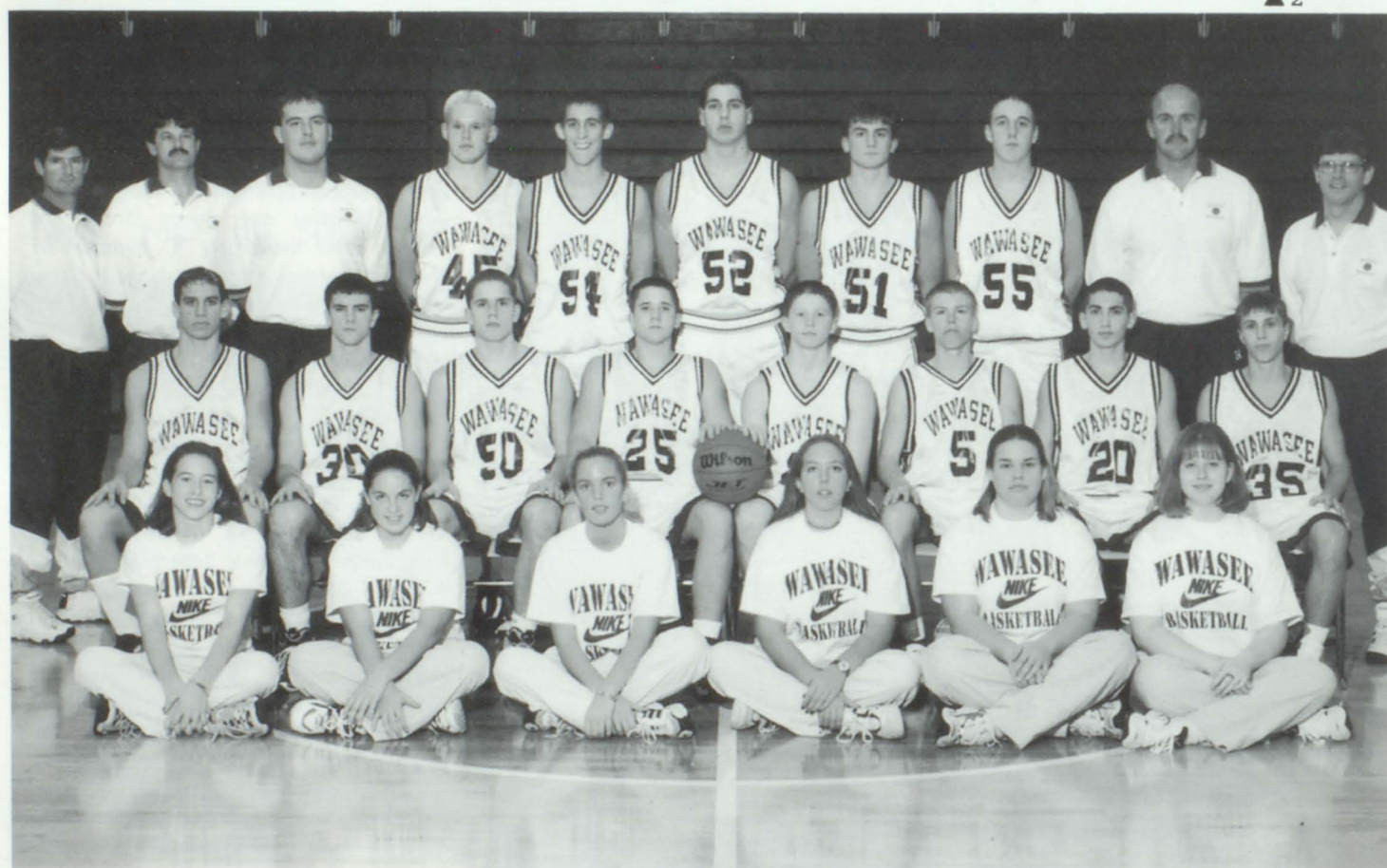

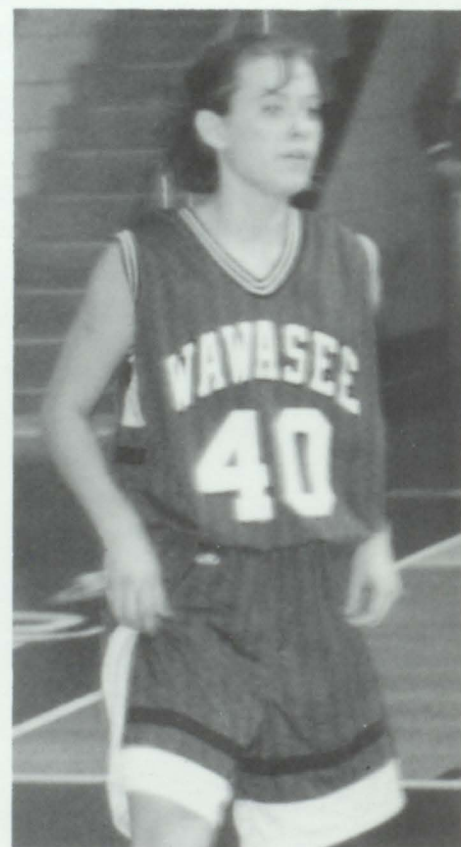

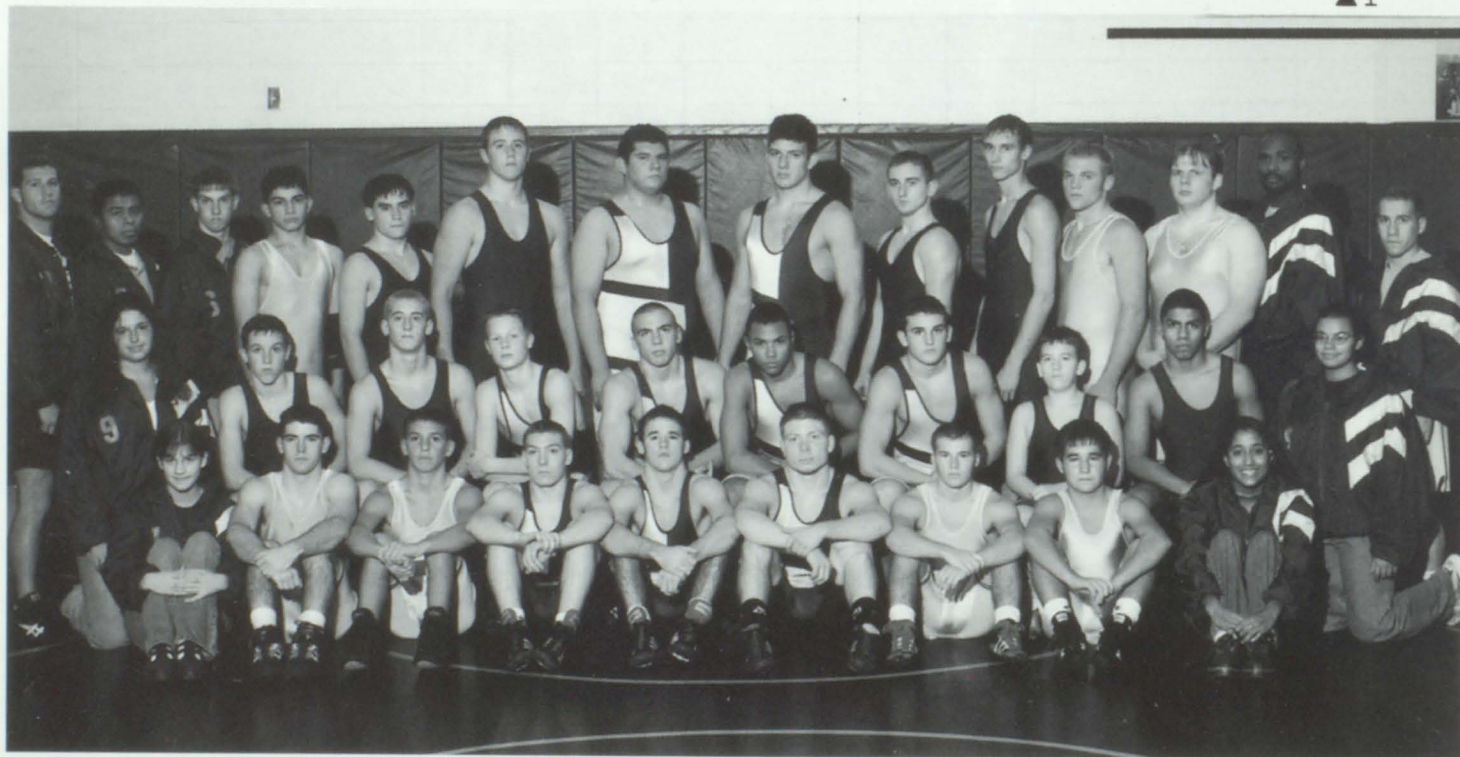
RePunishing With experience

Reaching For the stars

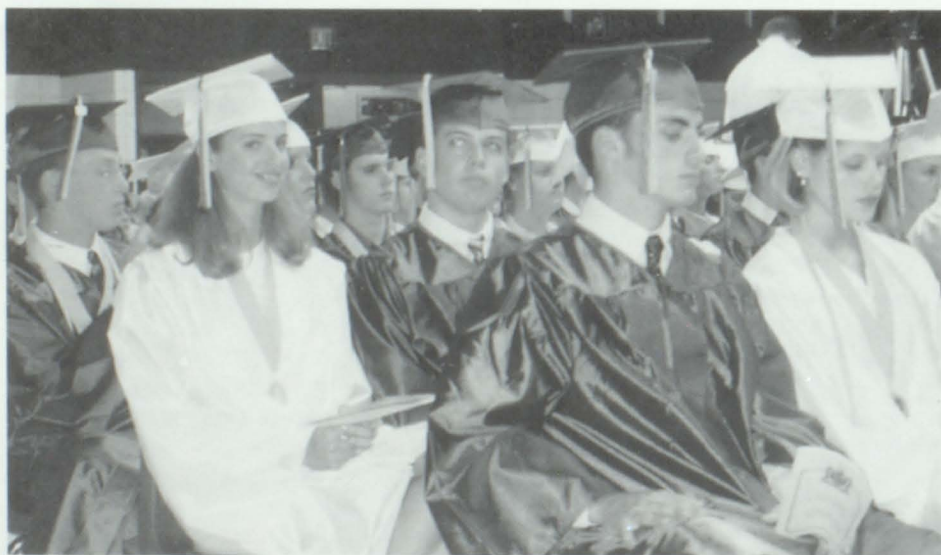

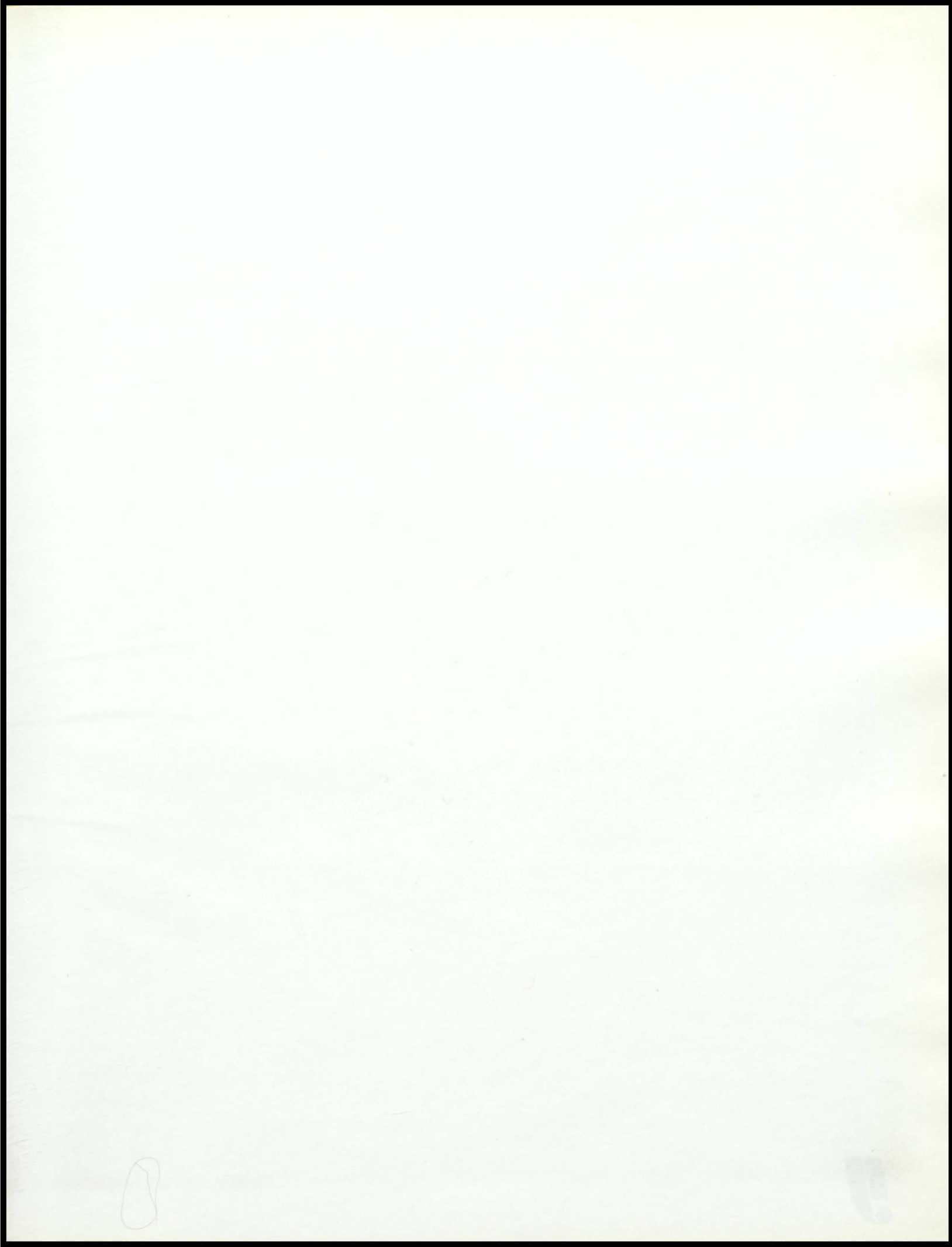
I've sat and watched the faces of my friends.
