
ReCruitment of new faces




Readminister With a great year





The cover was drawn by senior Brad Each of the Hursh. yearbooks cost students \$28 and an extra \$2 was paid by seniors if they wanted their names printed

on the covers. The contract price with Herff Jones was \$18,635.62 for 500 copies. The school's representative was Mrs. Frances Peel from Herff Jones. There were plenty of tasks that had to be completed by the end of There were the year. layouts that needed to be drawn, copy that had to be finished, and pictures that needed to be taken. Thanks to the hard work, effort, and time put in by the yearbook staff, the book was delivered in time for August registration.
